October
19th

Last day to Register to Vote Online!

Voters can still register in-person up until the final day of the election.

October
27th

Last Day to Request Mail-in Ballot!

31st

Vote Centers Open!

In-person voting centers open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. through the final day of the election for voters who need assistance, want to vote on an accessible tablet, need to obtain a replacement ballot, need language assistance, need to register and vote in person or any other reason.

3rd

ELECTION DEADLINE!

Final day to vote, either in-person or by mail.

(Mail-in ballots must be postmarked by the 3rd to be counted!)

How Do I Complete My Ballot?

Step 1: Confirm the ballot you have received is correct.

Verify the name, address and personal information on your ballot. If any of the information is incorrect, let a pollworker now at a Vote Center or call your Local Elections Office.

Step 2: Follow instructions to fill out your ballot correctly.

To vote, completely fill in the oval next to your choice using a blue or black ink pen.

Step 3: Sign your ballot.

Sign your name by the red "X", print your address and the date on the back of the return envelope. Your signature must match the signature on your voter registration card.

If your signature is missing or does not match your voter registration card, your ballot cannot be counted.

Step 4: Return your ballot.

Your voted ballot must be received by the Registrar of Voters by 8 p.m. on Election Day OR must be postmarked on or before Election Day.

Deliver or mail your ballot early, so it can be in the first Election Night Results!

State Assembly, District 26



Drew is a dedicated Tularean running to bring much-needed change and common sense to California's 26th Assembly District. Beginning in 2015, Drew actively led and organized residents of the district with Citizens for Hospital Accountability, whose members worked tirelessly to save the Tulare Regional Medical Center, which was dealing with significant financial, legal, and leadership issues. As a result of the 2-year long campaign, Citizens for Hospital Accountability succeeded in defeating an unwise bond measure that would have cost the county millions, recalling a board member who had been seated for over 20 years, and ultimately, replacing all 5 board members to ensure a fresh start for the Tulare Regional Medical Center.

Previously, Drew served as the Director of Grant Oversight with the Manuel Torrez Family Resource Center, bringing in funding for the Center's "Healthy Families, Happy Kids" initiative. Professionally, Drew works in land use and project management for Granville Homes, a Valley-based residential development company that builds homes for local working and middle-class families, including multi-family infill projects. Previously, he was a policy analyst and multimedia journalist with Granville's affiliated online news publication, GV Wire, which focuses on issues affecting our communities in the Tulare, Inyo, and Kern counties.

Drew was born and raised in the 26th District, attending St. Aloysius in Tulare for K-8. In high school, Drew maintained his commitment to serving others, winning the City of Tulare's "Volunteer of the Year" award for his work with the Tulare Senior Center and Meals on Wheels, among other organizations.

Drew earned his B.A. in Political Studies from Pitzer College and his M.A. in American Politics from Claremont Graduate University. During his time in school, Drew remained keenly invested in the well-being of our community, never once missing a vote in his home district. A strong believer in reaching across the aisle and working on issues of local importance, Drew interned for several Valley elected officials during his time in school, including former Assembly Minority Leader Connie Conway, Congressman Jim Costa, and former Senator Andy Vidak.
